For what?

(4) AIDS RESEARCH CENTER

The AIDS Research Center (ARC) was founded in April of 1988 to reinforce the research activities related to HIV/AIDS. The center consists of two major research groups and three research laboratories. Current research projects include basic research on the structure and replication of HIV and related viruses, pathogenesis of AIDS including histopathology and development of primate and nonprimate animal models and the establishment of conceptual and technological bases for HIV vaccine development.
